Here we go again. There's another reunion coming up, our 60<sup>th</sup>, on September 22 and 23. And, as has become a tradition, we'll have newsletters the three summer months leading up to the big event. The theme of this year's reunion is "Homecoming" and I'll be featuring some items here to share info about the home we're coming back to. You might think you recognize the St. Louis Park HS building as you pass by, but as we dig a little deeper, there are some things that are the same - and so much more that is very different. I hope you'll enjoy a look at St. Louis Park High School and the class of 2023.

#### DEI in St. Louis Park

You may have read or seen in news reports that DEI is pretty controversial in various parts of the country these days. Apparently, "diversity, equity and inclusion" are things that liberals have foisted upon educational institutions in this country and conservatives are prepared to zap those "woke" concepts out of existence. Some states (most, south of the Mason Dixon line) heard bills this legislative session to ban funding for DEI. Some have been successful; some not.

As it happens, St. Louis Park High School appears to have come by diversity the natural way. There is now a student population at St. Louis Park High School (grades 9–12) of 1,504 students. (Seniors, by the way, are 377 of those students – approximately 100 less than the size of our senior class and significantly less than the baby-boomer classes that came after ours.) The ethnic breakdown is as follows:

White	49.5%
Black, African American	25%
Hispanic, Latino	13%
Asian	3%
American Indian, Alaskan Native	0.5%
Two or more races	8%

A bit of a change isn't it??

I can't speak to the success of the "equity and inclusion" elements at Park High - but it appears there's quite a bit of that. A quick look at the list of student groups and array of students in leadership gives a sense of some level of success certainly. There's a Jewish student union and a Latino student association. There's a prayer room for Muslims. The first annual PowWow is being co-sponsored by the American Indian Advisory Council and the Youth Intertribal Council of SLP HS. There's a group called Students Organized Against Racism. And a Gender and Sexuality Alliance. By Your Side focuses on students with disabilities and Natural Helpers is a group of trained students who help other students with challenges. . . .



## While We're Looking at Numbers. . .

Four-year graduation rate at SLP HS (2020)	92.3%
Percent of grads who go to college within 16 months	86%
Number of International Baccalaureate classes	38
Number of varsity athletic teams	26

There are 160 courses offered (in a course catalog more like what we would have seen in college). They fall into 12 academic departments.

- Twelve different Advanced Placement (AP) courses, ranging from AP Micro- and Macro-economics to AP Psychology
- Thirty International Baccalaureate classes
- Post-Secondary Enrollment Options (for college courses while in high school both on campus and online)
- Twenty-one CTE courses for Technical or Community College credit (new in 2021-2022, students can earn a Certified Nursing Certificate free of charge)
- Building Assets Reducing Risks for students with special needs
- Learning Lab providing student aids
- 86 students were named to the Advanced Placement Scholar Roster.
  - 52 students were named AP Scholars
  - 10 AP Scholars of Honor
  - 24 AP Scholars of Distinction

Four students were awarded International Baccalaureate Diplomas.

Eight students have been recognized by the National Merit Scholarship Program, based on their PSAT scores.

• 2 were semi-finalists

• 6 were commended scholars

Six students were named Wallin Scholars (a state program) and will receive \$16,000 over four years – as well as continued advising and support.

Honors Graduates are named in three categories:

- Cum Laude
- Magna Cum Laude
- Summa Cum Laude

Students with a 4.0 average are recognized for Principal's Awards.

(SLP uses a 4.0 grading system – and AP and IB classes are not figured in. SLP no longer uses class rank.)

SLP HS has been named a Nationally Designated School of Excellence

and Named 30<sup>th</sup> Best Public High School for College Prep in MN.

There are 96 teachers, 83 of them with advanced degrees.

This is clearly enough of numbers. I hope I haven't bored you. You get the idea – there's been some changes. The next two issues will get into some of the more interesting programs, including a look inside some of the biggest changes in student life. Maybe some direct comparisons.
